National statistics according to NBCnews.com have shown that as of 2018, 37% of high school seniors vape or have tried vaping.

The popularity of vaping shares eerie similarities to the popularity of smoking in the 50's and 60's . Many people believe that they know what they are putting into their bodies, but they are not realizing how much damage they are consequently doing. If students were educated in the dangers of vaping, they would realize that vaping is only a new, high tech, way to smoke. The only thing a person could gain from vaping is terrible health, suspension, and various other consequences.



MAKING HISTORY FOR THE WRONG REASONS

Americans all around the country have now experienced United States history: the longest government shutdown. President Donald Trump kept the government shutdown for an astonishing 35 days. This meant that government workers were not paid, affecting the lives of families around the country. But the damage didn't stop there, as the economy was taken for a

ride as well, costing the U n i t e d States billions of dollars.

One of the root causes of this shutdown stems from the early campaigning by President Trump, where he started to make his promises to

"build a wall." The border is approximately 1,954 miles long, and is estimated to cost \$25 billion. President Trump has mentioned at various moments that he needed the wall to keep undocumented immigrants from crossing into the U.S illegally, thereby reducing human and drug trafficking. Trump had refused to consider any appropriations that would not include that demand. So, as soon as midnight struck on December 22, 2018, the government shutdown began.

Many departments were impacted by the government shutdown. In fact, about 800,000 workers in those departments were negatively affected by the shutdown because it caused them to miss their paychecks. About 380,000 workers had been furloughed and about 420,000 workers had to work without pay. Furthermore, these workers hadn't been able to strike because of the Taft-Hartley act of 1947, stating that it is actually illegal for federal employees to strike, and unions had refrained them from doing so.

Trump has said that if he can't negotiate with the Democrats, then he would need to declare a national emergency, as he stated that no border security plan can work without a physical barrier.

reimbursed after the shutdown. This still didn't change the fact that they still struggled for weeks.

An example of the repercusions of the shutdown could be felt in the FDA. The FDA commissioner, Dr. Scott Gottlieb, mentioned that he was trying to pinpoint the most important inspections to make sure that employees wouldn't need to suffer too much. Foreign food inspections had continued almost as normal because they had been considered more important. Yet the FDA had virtually stopped inspecting domestic food production facilities, potentially creating new threats of disease and sickness.

On January 25, President Trump an-

wall. Trump asserted that the flow of drugs, criminals, and illegal immigrants from Mexico constituted a threat to national security that justified the unilateral action. The emergency declaration would divert \$3.6 billion from military construction projects to the wall. Trump would also gather \$2.5 billion from the Counternarcotics programs and \$600 million from a Treasury Department asset forfeiture fund. With the \$1.375 billion authorized for fencing in the spending package from February 14th, Trump would have about \$8 billion in all for his wall.

This government shutdown came with dire outcomes, not all of which have truly manifested themselves just yet.

THE CHINESE INTERNMENT PROBLEM

International Holocaust Remembrance Day, held on January 27th, reminded the world of the dangers surrounding groupthink, marginalization, and systematic oppression. Through this lens, the plight of the Uighur ethnic minority and others in the Xinjiang province is especially troubling. For reference, most of China is ethnic Han, Xinjiang is primarily composed of Uighurs. Uighurs are a Turkic ethnicity and are predominantly Sufi Muslims.

Political suppression and repression are not new phenomena in China. The Cultural Revolution of Mao Zedong outwardly resulted in the deaths of hundreds of thousands of Mongolic and Hui minorities, their houses of worship and holy books burned. In 1989, the Tiananmen Square Massacre resulted in the deaths of thousands of reform protestors in China. Now, however, efforts to repress, marginalize, and forcibly assimilate Uighurs are discreet. One of the first steps in a genocidal campaign is dehumanization. Cui Tiankai, China's ambassador to the US, told Reuters that China wants to turn Uighurs into "normal persons". This mentality to "kill the Uighur", in terms of identity, heritage, and beliefs is dangerous and has the potential to snowball out of control. It is important to note that systematic oppression is affecting those who are not homogeneously Han; as such, Christian minorities and others are also facing systematic repression.

The September 2018 Human Rights Watch (HRW) Report entitled, "Eradicating Ideological Viruses" China's Campaign of Repression Against Xinjiang's Muslims" describes the sophisticated surveillance efforts, lack of due process, and political indoctrination occurring at the hands of the Chinese government. The report also underscores efforts by the Chinese government to justify Uighur detainment through China's "Strike Hard Campaign against Violent Terrorism". While citizens must reconcile enhanced national security with the loss of civil liberties, the objective security interest is ambiguous in the case of the Uyghur oppression.

US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo condemned the 're-education camps' in China. However, the world depends on the The Commander-in-Chief of the free world to take action. A New York Times piece by The Editorial Board highlighted the need for President Donald Trump to meaningfully address acts of oppression directed to the Uighur people. They argue that unlike President George H.W. Bush who had the political acumen to challenge China following the Tiananmen Square Massacre, President Trump has no experience in this delicate space.

The movie portrays the city of Atlantis as an underwater kingdom ruled by King Orm, a tyrant with no regard for human safety. Orm had a massive army at his disposal and he planned to conquer the remaining people of the ocean and then the surface world. Standing in his way was Aquaman, his half-human-atlantean brother. Aquaman retrieves the legendary Trident of Atlantis and embraces his destiny as protector of the ocean by defeating Orm and his army and consequently stopping a deadly war.

The scenes where Aquaman fights off Orm's army and Orm himself are the best fight scenes in the movie. Their fights were the most intense and filled with spectacle. Aquaman consisted of a good balance be-

tween action and emotion. The romance shown throughout the movie between Aquaman and Mera is believable and builds a needed emotional grounding to the theatrics. The balance between the two halves is something lacking from other DC Universe films, notably Justice League.

Throughout the movie, spoilers and sneak peeks of possible future DC movies were given to us, but some were hard to recognize. There were many 'Easter eggs' placed throughout the movie including the post credit scene, where there is a newspaper that has Coast City, Green Lantern's hometown, written on it. In the scene there is a billboard that says "Welcome to Coast City, Home of Ferris Airlines," but, the billboard has burn marks on it. Could this be foreshadowing a new Green Lantern and Aquaman movie, where they work together to defeat Black Manta?

An additional post-credit scene featured

an enemy named Black Manta that tried to kill Aquaman twice in the movie in some insane fights but was always unsuccessful. He has a great deal of rage and hatred for Aquaman because he killed his father, his grandfather, and his crew. In the scene Black Manta was in his bed injured, and another man (the news reporter who always knew the reasons behind all the weird occurrences by the water), is in the room with him as he is working on a new, powerful suit for the end of Aquaman. This seems like a sequel is very likely to happen.

Overall, Aquaman was a very good film that could appeal to a variety of people. Some enjoyed the movie because of the entertaining action scenes, the ongoing love stories and the foreshadowing.



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
