The National Merit Scholarship Program is a highly competitive academic contest that sees approximately 1.6 million students across the United States compete. It is with great honor and pride that we congratulate two of our seniors, Viveka Jain and Sarah Choi, for being National Merit Semi-Finalists!

There were about 16,000 Semi-Finalists chosen from the National Merit Scholarship Program, out of 1.6 million students who took the test. The girls' scores were among the highest in New York. This prestigious distinction is given to students who take the PSAT in their junior year, and make a specific cut-off score for their state. This is an extremely impressive award that two of our students managed to meet, on top of maintaining high grades with their school work and participating in school clubs and activities.

To prepare for the exam, Sarah did practice tests three to five months before the test. Her main focus was to do well on the SATs, and by preparing well for the SATs, she performed strongly on the PSAT. This program acts as a great opportunity for students who are already preparing to take the SATs in their junior year, since the tests are similar. Like many students who take difficult tests, Sarah initially believed she did poorly, but was very relieved when she found out her impressive score in December. She recommends for future students planning to take this test to "do the practice tests in one sitting, ask teachers for help, and don't worry too much." In September of this year, when the test was off of her mind completely, Mr. Williams called her and Viveka down to his office to inform them that they were National Merit Semi-Finalists. The girls embarked upon this new school year with fantastic news.

With their fellow semifinalists, Viveka and Sarah are now competing for one of the 7,600 National Merit Scholarships awarded to finalists. Finalists will be an-

nounced in February, and the winners will be named in spring of 2020. We wish Viveka and Sarah the best of luck!

It also gives prospective graduating students an insight into different schools that they are interested in by talking to representatives from those schools. Lots of students at Hicksville high school found different colleges they weren't necessarily looking at before but now are because of their representation in the gymnasium.

The college fair, however, had some downsides that could be fixed for the future. It bears repeating that there weren't as many schools as last year, so even though the event was approximately two hours long, many kids stayed for a short period of time and then left. One of those students was

Kayla, "I was only there for maybe 20 minutes when I had hoped to stay for longer, but I felt there was nothing left for me there." Some students want schools more local, some students apply to schools that are out of state, and some students may want to go to schools that have other students from similar backgrounds, communities, or races as them.

Another issue that was brought up by Kayla was the lack of representation from historically black colleges and universities (HBCU). "As a black student, I felt there were no HBCU schools there and... maybe the school can work on that for future black students." As Hicksville high school's diversity grows throughout the years, so should the programs and the types of invitations sent to different schools at the college fair to try to accommodate for all the students

and all the different races at Hicksville. Hicksville high school opened in 1953, during a period where a lot of segregation and discrimination occurred. That we have a significantly diverse population across many different ethnicities should be recognized, and we should continue to grow as best as we possibly can through the inclusion of HBCU colleges at the very least. Overall the college fair was a very enlightening event that helped many students answer the questions they were looking for.

The college fair is indeed very helpful, especially for seniors and juniors who are looking at different colleges and want to ask questions to a representative. Whether it is just for 20 minutes or the whole two hours, it's a good idea to do everything you can to prepare for college so that when the time comes you are not stressed and filled with anxiety but instead filled with excitement for a new chapter in your life.

When asked about her opinion on the new cafeteria, Elizabeth responded by saying she likes “the look of it better than last year.” Both Elizabeth and Selina emphasize that they like the “modern” look of the cafeteria now. Students also expressed that the new tables make them feel more connected to each other, and it is easier to have conversations. According to students of various grade levels, the previous cafeteria made it harder for people to hear each other and communicate effectively.

AN ITERATION... NOT A REVOLUTION

Year after year, Apple comes out with a new iPhone trying to exceed expectations and please the public. Did they succeed this year? During the Fall 2019 Apple Product Event, they announced three new smartphones: iPhone 11, iPhone 11 Pro, and iPhone 11 Pro Max.

It became quickly apparent that the camera lenses were all people could talk about, especially the ultra-wide angle lens. The camera also comes equipped with Night Mode, which allows pictures to actually look very presentable in low light settings. And of course, the inevitable, an iPhone battery life extension. The iPhone 11s also have many features that have never been on an Apple product before.

The most affordable phone, with a starting retail price of \$699, is the iPhone 11. The new phone has a 6.1" LCD Liquid

Retina display, making it in between the other 2019 model sizes. New aspects to the electronic device include the wide and ultra-wide lenses instead of the wide and telephoto lenses on the last model. The ultra-wide lens consists of a 13mm focal length, which allows the photographer to capture a large area without having to move further away. Aperture on this lens is a high $f/2.4$, meaning that more light is needed to produce a good image, therefore the ultra-wide lens is best for landscape and outdoor photos. The wide lens is a standard 26mm focal length, but has a fast $f/1.8$ aperture. It is better for indoor and low-light settings. The iPhone 11 also has a new wide angle sensor that performs an astonishing 100% in Focus Pixels, allowing every photo to be in focus quicker, something that has never been seen on an iPhone. Night Mode is another aspect that is new; it is meant to capture better shots in darker surroundings. It works by using multiple pictures from one shot and emitting a longer exposure time. Another technological advancement on the Night Mode is how it automatically adjusts contrast, color, sharpness, and noise reduction for a more well-rounded photo. Smart HDR is the improvement to the previous model's HDR, it automatically adjusts the highlights and shadows, improving the camera's dynamic range. Overall, the iPhone 11 camera has been completely revamped for the better. One more major feature included on the iPhone 11 is the water resistance, which is good for spills and submerging underwater at a 6 feet maximum depth for 30 minutes. The battery life is

also one hour longer than the iPhone XR. This iPhone 11 seems to check most boxes for what consumers expect with a new model.

Apple produced two more iPhones, the iPhone 11 Pro and the iPhone 11 Pro Max. The displays are better than the iPhone 11 since they have an OLED Super Retina Display, showing more vibrant colors and pixels. The iPhone 11 Pro is 5.8" and the iPhone Pro Max is 6.5". Price points vary, starting at \$999 for the Pro and \$1,099 for the Pro Max. On top of the other lenses and their abilities, these smartphones include a third lens, the telephoto. The focal lens is a 52mm equivalent and has a aperture of $f/2$. Deep Fusion is a new element added to the iPhone Pros; it allows for all the cameras to create one composite image from nine distinct photos. No other smartphone in this class can compare to the iPhone 11 Pro's camera abilities. Apple claims that the iPhone 11 Pro has an astonishing 4 hours of extra battery life than the iPhone XS, with the iPhone 11 Pro Max having 1 more hour on top of that. Both pros are also water resistant at a maximum depth of 13 feet for 30 minutes. The current lineup of iPhones come complete with Dual-Sim capabilities, iOS 13, Face ID, camera zooming functions and wireless charging.

Overall, if you need a functioning smartphone, any iPhone 11 is a great choice. Yet, out of the three shown to us this year, the iPhone 11 Pro exceeds all expectations. It edges out the iPhone 11 because of its amazing display, extra battery life, and added telephoto camera. While the iPhone 11 Pro Max was a close second, the main differences are a larger display, but same quality and an extra hour of battery life, which isn't deemed necessary for all. The iPhone 11 Pro is the true winner of this smartphone season.

HURRICANE DORIAN

Hurricane Dorian was the second hurricane and the first major hurricane of the 2019 Atlantic hurricane season. On August 24, 2019, Dorian was formed by a tropical wave in the Central Atlantic and slowly intensified as it headed towards the Lesser Antilles, becoming a hurricane on August 28. Rapid intensification occurred, which led Dorian to become a Category 4 hurricane. On September 1, Dorian had attained Category 5 strength with maximum sustained winds of 185 mph and a minimum central pressure of 910 Mb (26.97 inHg) after landing in Elbow Cay, Bahamas. Several hours later, the hurricane made another landfall on the Grand Bahama. The high-pressure ridge caused Dorian to stall for a day just north of Grand Bahama. It is the most active tropical storm to have an impact on the Bahamas. The combination of cold water upwelling and an eyewall replacement cycle weakened Dorian to a Category 2 hurricane on the next day. On the morn-

ing of September 3, Dorian began to move gradually to the north-northwest. Subsequently, Dorian completed its eyewall replacement cycle and traveled over warmer water, regaining Category 3 strength by midnight on September 5. In the early hours of September 6, Dorian weakened to Category 1 intensity as it picked up speed and turned northeast. Dorian picked up the pace and traveled northeast along the North Carolina coast on September 6. Then it moved south of the Crystal Coast, reaching Cape Lookout and finally making landfall at Cape Hatteras. By Monday morning, September 9, Hurricane Dorian was a post-tropical storm after the mid-latitude weather, and cold seas had altered its tropical characteristics.

One week after Hurricane Dorian hit the Bahamas, residents still faced catastrophic destruction, with more than 70,000 people reported to have been left without

food and shelter. Support from the international community had already been reached. But amid relief efforts, people had a hard time finding shelter, with many evacuees struggling to find their loved ones. Hurricane Dorian's death toll in the Bahamas had risen to 50, as more deaths were reported from the storm that swept across the country. Furthermore, about 2,500 people were missing after Hurricane Dorian. A preliminary report that Dorian caused about \$7 billion in damage. Hurricane Dorian was one of the most powerful Atlantic hurricanes in history. The devastation left behind is like nothing that the Bahamas have experienced before
